Welcome to Market Place



We invite you to read on and find out more about the history of this area.

On 25th November 1251 Henry III visited Darley Abbey while hunting. At the Abbot's request he granted Ripley a weekly market and annual fair by signing a charter later that year. These were held on what was then known as "The Green".

In the early 19th century people generally travelled by stagecoach or on horseback. By the 1820's there were several stagecoaches passing through Ripley on weekdays. The Royal Mail went to Birmingham and London daily. The slower coach "Amity" went from Leeds to Birmingham, the "Champion" travelled from Nottingham to Buxton.

In addition, there were carriers' carts and wagons usually going to Derby and Nottingham and back. Coaching ended when the railway arrived.

Ripley Fair has been held on the Market Place since the 1251 Charter. Since the mid 19th century it has always been around the 23rd October. It had a good reputation for horse sales, but there were also many entertainments such as jugglers, melodramas, shooting galleries and a "ghost show". Many different items were on sale, including spices, salt, cloth, wool and linen. The fair was noted for "huge retailing and consumption of pork pie."

The Local Board was formed in 1867 and took over the market and fair, constructing the Market Place and a Market Hall. The market flourished and in the 20th century many buses from surrounding areas came into the town, bringing shoppers. The market often stayed open until 10pm!

Built on the site of a White House that had stood on the Green for many years, the Market Hall was not successful and was replaced by a new Town Hall in 1880.

This was the home of Ripley Urban District Council until 1974 when it was replaced in the national local government re-organisation by Amber Valley Borough Council. New Council offices were built in the 1990s on the site of Street's fish and chip shop and Scarsdale House on Cromford Rd, the home and surgery of Dr Ryan for many years.



The top of Lowes Hill, next to the Market Place was renamed Church Street when the new church was built in 1821. Next to the old White Lion alehouse there was a path that led to a pin fold and "Stone Jug", the House of Confinement. This was used to detain those who misbehaved, often drunkards. In 1904 this track became Grosvenor Road.

Slack Lane was a medieval pack horse trail eventually reaching the Roman road at Street Lane. The slabs surfacing it were still in place until 1973.

The Ripley Youth Hub was forced to take a break during the lockdowns, but we are pleased to have them back up and running now.



Butterley Ironworks Trust update

A crowd-funding appeal on behalf of the Butterley Ironworks Trust (BIT) recently raised over £11,000* and the money is already being put to use.

BIT has appointed the Focus Consultancy to provide the Trust with professional advice, expertise and support. The plan is that this appointment will be a catalyst towards securing a sustainable future for the heritage on the Butterley Ironworks site.

BIT's Chair, Steve Freeborn observed:

There is much still to do. Whilst BIT has got a clear vision for the future, it needs to be financially self-sustaining and that will need co-operation amongst all parties. We are talking with Godkin Holdings and the Aquarius Estates planning consultants, so I am hopeful we will work out a shared way forward.

Amongst ideas being followed up is the provision of a Visitor Centre in one of the original buildings that

remain. There is little doubt any such scheme will be dependent on Heritage Lottery funding of the renovation and reconstruction costs. Focus Consultancy have previously managed other successful heritage lottery applications and the Town Council wish them every success.

A redeveloped Butterley site, especially one with a significant tourist attraction, will not only safeguard the site's heritage it will also provide permanent jobs.

Greenwich Park Update

Ripley Town Council would like to keep everyone informed about the current position concerning Greenwich Recreation Ground on Nottingham Road in Ripley.



The recreation ground is actually two pieces of land, some currently owned by Amber Valley Borough Council (approximately the cricket ground) and the rest by a charity known as 'The Ripley Recreation Ground Charity', charity number 520502, (approximately the football pitch, car park and the new buildings).

Although the formal handover of the buildings has been delayed by the Covid pandemic, Ripley Town Council have been appointed as Managing Trustees of the Charity. It is important to know that the Charity Scheme dictates there is no financial benefit to the Town Council because if the Charity's land is no longer required as a recreation ground, any proceeds from sale must be given back to the Coal

Industry Social Welfare Organisation (CISWO).

The Town Council intends to act as Custodian Trustee of the Charity's land and appoint a different charity to manage the day to day operation of the football pitch and buildings. The building will be known as 'Greenwich Community Rooms', with the function room available for hire by the public for meetings, entertainment, parties etc.

Some years ago the football pitch, currently used by the successful Ripley Town Football Club, was re-laid to improve the drainage. Unfortunately this was not successful and drainage is still poor. The Town Council hopes that, subject to funding being available, the football pitch will be replaced by an artificial floodlit pitch to enable everyday use throughout the year by many different clubs and organisations.

Currently, the cricket ground remains in the ownership of Amber Valley Borough Council.

Now that Covid restrictions are being changed, it is expected that the formal handover of the building will take place shortly and that the Town Council will be actively promoting the use of the building and making improvements to the pitches.



Ripley Wild Flowerers

We hope you have noticed that there are several areas of wildflowers appearing around Ripley!

It started with a conversation in the pub about how we wanted to see less mown grass, more wildflowers, and more bees, then it became two people sowing seeds in the dark, then four people writing lists of places we wanted to grow wildflowers and this year has become a Facebook group with over 260 followers!

With the help of donations of money, plants and seeds, alongside a grant from Amber Valley Centre for Voluntary Services, a small but enthusiastic band of volunteers cut turf and sowed the new beds.

They were faithfully watered by some exceedingly kind little helpers, along with their mums. We are now very excited to see beautiful flowers and many bees, butterflies and other insects being drawn to all the sites.

We have lots of plans! We are delighted to have just won £250 of vouchers in a competition run by Natures Path. Futures Housing have been really helpful with advice and are really keen to help develop lots of their sites into natural planted areas, so next year we will have more plots and some new trees, including fruit trees.

We would really love to have a community orchard and community garden and also see more business premises take part in what is becoming a really popular, growing (excuse the pun) national movement. Ripley Town Centre update

On 16th July 2021, representatives from Ripley Town Council met with several Ripley Town Centre Traders in the Council Chamber at Ripley Town Hall.

It had been over a year since the group last convened due to the pandemic. Ripley Town Council updated the group regarding the new Welcome Back Fund that Amber Valley Borough Council had invited us to become a Delivery Partner for. We are pleased to report that Ripley Town Council have been successful in obtaining £30k from the European Regional Development Fund.

The core objective of the fund is to create and promote a safe environment for local trade and tourism, particularly in high streets. Ripley Town Council will be delivering the following projects throughout the next year:

Promotional Digital Video promoting Ripley Town Centre, Ripley Market, the diverse range of independent shops and eating/drinking establishments in Ripley Town Centre. This will include tourist attractions such as Midland Railway, plans for the former Butterley Ironworks site and Heage Windmill. It will have a focus on a safe, enjoyable shopping experience and the importance of shopping locally.

Deep Clean of the pavements in the Town Centre to remove gum and weeds.

Ripley in Bloom - additional floral displays in the Town Centre and at the entrances to the town, particularly in winter months.

Local business directory - a free publication advertising local businesses and services, which will be delivered to all the 14,500 homes in the Ripley Township. This will promote safe, enjoyable shopping and the importance of shopping locally and supporting local businesses.

Shopping to music - musicians to play around the Town Centre on Saturdays to make the shopping experience an enjoyable and memorable one.



Planning for our Future

I hope you don't suffer from planning fatigue, but another Local Development Scheme (LDS) was approved by Amber Valley Borough Council on 9th June 2021. You may have missed it, but then it doesn't seem to have been publicised by AVBC – it's the ninth in 17 years!

The LDS is important as it sets out a revised timetable for AVBC to deliver a new Local Plan for the Borough, a Plan set to last until 2038.

June 2021

Approval of alternative spatial strategy options

July-September 2021

Consultation and engagement on alternative spatial strategy options

June 2022

Approval of a Pre-Submission Local Plan

June - July 2022

Publication of the Pre-Submission Local Plan

September 2022

You will see that the steps for the adoption of a new Local Plan has started with AVBC consulting about the "Alternative Spatial Strategy Options". It may sound like gobbledy-gook, but the Spatial Strategy to be chosen by AVBC, will be the bedrock of the Local Plan. So, the Spatial Strategy chosen is extremely important - amongst other things, it will effectively sort out whether more Green Belt land is to be lost.

Ripley Town Council believes that there is no need for new housing sites in Ripley and no need for loss of Green Belt land. This is because we know many sites already have planning permission but have not yet been built. In one case, the approval was given in the 1990's and still there is not one house on the site!

Arguably, the biggest housing problem in Ripley is not any lack of executive homes, but the lack of quality social housing available for a reasonable rent.

Further, the Town Council believes sustainability should be at the heart of spatial planning, with travel distances for work minimised. Whatever your views, Ripley Town Council hopes that record numbers of people will respond to the consultations that AVBC will carry out.

The first of these (on Spatial Planning) is underway - the details of this are on our website and social media. Information about the different consultations when they happen will appear on our social media platforms, so please check regularly.
