Council Tax 2020 / 2021

Ripley Town Council have agreed the budget for 2020 / 2021. The budget will maintain current services and help replenish reserves following the spending on the community facility at Greenwich Park in Ripley.

The budget will see an increase in the Ripley Town Council element of Council Tax of £0.10 per week, based on the average Council Tax Band D property.

How Ripley Town Council grants are helping the community

Each year, Ripley Town Council give grants to local groups in the township to help with their community activities. Here is a small snapshot of some of the groups who have benefitted from a grant in the past year.

Marehay Cricket Club

We gave: £750 to train and pay coaches at all levels.



Ripley Music Festival

We gave: £3000 which went towards putting the wonderful musical events on for the local community.



Ripley Morris

We gave: £100 for them to use for publicising their group and recruiting new members and for new kit.



Waingroves Well Dressing

We gave: £200 to buy materials for the well dressing and repair the frames for the well dressings.



Waingroves Community Association

We gave: £100 to help towards redecorating the kitchen in the community centre.



B.E.A.R.S Breastfeeding

We gave: £100 to help fund promotional materials so they could promote breastfeeding within the local community.



Amber Valley Movie Makers

We gave: £100 for the group to buy equipment.

The group said, 'Ripley Town Council have been invaluable to us in helping to keep our Club going'.



Waingroves Community Woodland Trust

We gave: £200 which was used to install 18 Nature Trail signs around the woodland.



Ripley & District Heritage Trust

We gave: £200 which helped towards hosting their first Heritage Day at Greenwich Community Centre in 2019. Many people attended and shared stories about Ripley over the years.

You'll know from previous newsletters that Ripley Town Council are working with Trent Rivers Trust by financially supporting their project in our community. Their aim is to bring local businesses, communities and organisations together to make our brooks cleaner, more enjoyable and richer in wildlife.

They have been working in Ripley with the Friends of Carr Wood, Rethink Mental Health, Derbyshire Autism Services, the Friends of Ripley Greenway and Groundwork.

In Carr Wood you'll see a new informal path, which has been christened 'Lakeside Boulevard' along the lake and the little brook. There are plans to make some steps soon on Ripley Greenway near Marehay, to help get down to a lovely stretch of brook and we hope to cover this path with wood chippings.

Rebecca Dilks of Ferrero commented: "Working with the Trent Rivers Trust has not only


